Loan Word Clippings in Japanese - 1

Japanese has borrowed an extremely large number of words from other languages, especially English. Shortened or "clipped" forms of many of these loan words have come into use. In this problem and the next one, we look at some of the linguistic constraints that these loan word clippings obey.

1. <u>Melody Selection</u>

2. <u>The Bisiyllabic Minimim</u>

A loan word clipping in Japanese must consist of at least two syllables.

(1) Minimal loan word clipping: $\sigma \sigma$
