#### Guatemala

- Captaincy of Guatemala was subordinate to the Viceroyalty of New Spain (Mexico), but in practice was largely independent
- Spanish had (and has) less of a foothold in Guatemala than in most other parts of Latin America - Spanish is spoken in the urban centers, but many do not speak it or speak it marginally in rural areas
- Lack of mineral wealth and ports meant it was ignored by Spain and pirates - led to linguistic isolation
- Mayan languages (Quiché) are dominant

# Quiché



## Phonology

- weak /x/
- assibilated /rr/, /tr/, and word-final /r/
- some /n/ velarization
- lack of s-deletion/aspiriation

## Morphology

- Voseo (sos, cantás, etc.)
- \* tú carries social prestige among Ladinos (those who identify with Spanish heritage)
- A good deal of complexity in choice of pronouns

### Syntax

\* 'Una mi amiga' - suggested Mayan influence, but found in older forms of Spanish

### Alvaro Colom



#### Costa Rica

- Columbus touched on it in 1502
- First colony established a few years later
- Part of Veraguas from Honduras to Panama
- Became a separate province in 1573

#### Isolation

- Little mineral wealth
- Part of Captaincy of Guatemala, but remained isolated from the neighboring Panama and Nicaragua
- No large ports, hence little direct trade with Spain
- Rebellious Native population encomienda system was not feasible
- Mence, small farmers not large land holdings
- Less immigration from Andalucia than elsewhere in Central and Caribbean America

- velar /n/
- / tr/ > /č/ (so otro and ocho sound almost the same)
- retroflex /r/, assibilated
- / rr/ > / ž/
- weak /d/
- strong /s/
- raising of /e/ and /o/, particularly among women

## Morphology

- \*\* voseo, but usted used among close friends and family members; sometime -ais form, sometimes -ás form
- \* -ico/-tico diminutives (hence, "Ticos")

- Little Native American impact
  - chinear 'to spoil'
  - chingo 'naked'
  - chirote 'excellent'
  - concho 'peasant'
  - güila 'child'
  - macho 'blonde'
  - molote 'wild event'
